These churches work together through approximately 1,182 associations, 41 state conventions, 1 fellowship and the Southern Baptist Convention to accomplish through voluntary cooperation far more than they could ever do alone.

The Cooperative Program helps to support over 5,100 IMB missionaries who are engaging in 1,170 different people groups around the world. ### BSU/Collegiate Student Ministry “Know Him, Make Him Known—JESUS”

The BSU ministries have really started with a bang this year. We made 148 “Welcome” bags for the dorm students and then learned that the college moved in 152 students, stuffing students in other rooms other than the dorms. Thank you churches for donating cookies and finances to help us with this ministry. We had about 100 students drop by the welcome booth that day to sign up for the gift certificate drawing. Different family members shared with me later how they appreciated the gift bag their student received from us.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday lunch hosted by Coon Creek served 40 students, Shelburn hosted the 2<sup>nd</sup> luncheon serving 60, the 3<sup>rd</sup> lunch hosted by 1<sup>st</sup> Trenton served 84 lunches, and Gallatin serving their famous crock pot pizza hosted 53 students. I not only want to thank these churches for getting this ministry started and sharing a devotional with our students, but also would like to thank all you churches who have stepped forward and scheduled a Wednesday to help continue this ministry. We had 2 students in the second week indicate that they prayed to receive Jesus as their personal Savior. Praise Jesus! This is the reason you continue to support this ministry and why I continue to call on you for help. If you haven’t already scheduled your week of ministry please call soon, as we have some open dates that are coming up quickly. The following are open dates: Oct. 8, Nov. 5, Nov. 12, Nov. 26 (estimate maybe 15 or 20), Dec. 3, and Dec. 10 (estimate 20 students as this is finals week). These are the only dates that remain open for an opportunity to reach out and minister to campus students and share Jesus with them. I also want to thank the pastors who have made time out of their busy schedules to share with the students. Your sharing really blessed our ministry. Thank you.

Both Sunday Night Alive nights have kept Gene, Ann and me hoping. Just when I thought I had cooked enough for 10 hay crews, we ran out of food, making Gene and then Ann run to Hy-Vee to buy more, cook more and minister to more hungry students. We had 33 students the first time and 47 the second week. The first Sunday night I showed the DVD “Stop and Think” which is an evangelist video of a wave-surfing pastor sharing the gospel story. The second week God led me to show “How Great is our God”. It nearly blew me away to see 47 students stop eating and become mesmerized as Louis Giglio shared Psalms 93, and Col. 1:17 how everything is held together in Christ Jesus, and has been scientifically proven through a molecular biologist from Texas when he discovered “Laminin”. Have you heard about “Laminin”? Check it out on [www.youtube.com](http://www.youtube.com). You will be blown away too!!! I want to publicly thank Maggie Bush for the huge bottle of picante sauce, #10 can of cheese sauce and #10 can of pinto beans. What a practical way to minister to the students. Thanks Maggie.
